



municipality. He is taking steps to increase

accountability in all our departments.

- County plans on completing 3 bridge file replacements at approx. 1.2 million
- Finish old gravel pit reclamation
- Pulverize remaining 2.5km of pavement back to gravel on TWP 30-2 east of highway 9
- Complete Michichi irrigation and groundwork in campground
- Complete Morrin Cemetery upgrades access road, gates, columbarium, tree planting, concrete pillows.
- Improve vehicle access & parking at Rumsey Cemetery
- Upgrading some piping at the Rumsey water

station for better operations.

In addition to these projects, Council is committed economic development and has directed administration to explore opportunities in this area. We plan to pursue a small modular reactor (SMR) in Starland County and become a leader in this technology for the region. We are looking to promote value added agriculture and exploring possibilities for industrial development. We are pursuing broadband in the County to provide faster and more reliable

internet service.

As cellular service is an ongoing issue in many areas of the County, we have had discussions with Telus on improving this service. As indicated by the service providers the lack of available spectrum is one of the big issues. We are monitoring the current discussions by the Senate and have asked to speak at these hearings to represent our region and the issues.

We will keep you updated on the progress of these projects through our website, social media, and Voyent Alerts. We welcome your feedback and suggestions on how we can make our municipality a better place to live, work, and play.

IT'S NOT TOO LATE TO SIGN UP FOR TIPPS!!





TIPPS Application Link

In January of this year, Starland County implemented a TIPPs (Tax Installment Payment Plan) program. Eligible taxpayers are now able to pay their current year taxes over twelve equal pre-authorized monthly installments, penalty free, from January to December of each current tax year. Taxpayers wishing to enroll into the program after the January deadline of each year will be required to pay the total amount of the monthly installments missed prior to enrollment. Then the regular monthly pre-authorized direct debit payments will commence.

A taxpayer is not eligible to enter this plan if there is any outstanding amount owing on the tax roll. The monthly installment amount shall be one-twelfth of the previous year's tax levy until such time the current year's tax levy is calculated. An adjustment shall be made to this monthly installment amount to ensure that the current year's taxes will be paid in full by the end of the year. Pre-authorized automatic withdrawals/debit from the taxpayer's bank account shall be made on the last business day of each month. Once a taxpayer is enrolled in the plan, the plan will automatically renew each year.

A taxpayer can opt out of the plan at any time with fifteen days written notice to the Administration of Starland County. If a taxpayer fails to make one payment, the taxpayer shall be notified that a second payment attempt will be made in fifteen days. If the second attempt fails, the plan shall be automatically canceled, and penalties shall accrue.

LOCAL ROADS AND PROVINCIAL HIGHWAYS

The Public Works Department of Starland County works to build and maintain the local road system of Township and Range Roads in addition to hamlet road networks. In addition to major road rebuilding, services such as grading, dust control, road graveling, pothole repair, snow removal, and surfacing are provided throughout the year.

PUBLIC WORKS

SUMMER PROJECTS

Public works are essential for maintaining and improving the quality of life in our communities. They provide us with safe roads, bridges, culverts, water systems, parks and more. This summer, several public works projects will be underway in our area, aiming to enhance our infrastructure and environment. Here is a brief overview of what you can expect to see happening:

Gartley Road, TWP 30-2 - Road Surface Project from Highway 9 East to Howard's (2 miles): This project will involve resurfacing a two-mile stretch of Gartley Road to improve its condition and durability. The project is expected to start and finish in May, weather permitting. Traffic will be reduced to one lane during construction hours, so please drive with caution and follow the signs.

Bridge replacement BF#6918 on 160 North of Highway 9: This project will replace an existing bridge over a creek with a new one that meets current standards and specifications. The bridge will be closed during construction and a detour route will be posted. Dates TBA on Voyent Alerts

Bridge replacement BF#70286 on 19-2 North of Rowley Road: This project will replace an existing timber bridge over a stream with a new bridge-sized culvert that is more durable and environmentally friendly. Dates TBA on Voyent Alerts. The bridge will be closed during construction and a temporary road will be built to get around the construction site.

Morton Gravel Pit - Archaeological study: This project will continue the archaeological study that was initiated last year at the Morton Gravel Pit site, where evidence of ancient human activity was discovered. The study aims to document and preserve the cultural heritage of the area before any further development takes place. Dates TBA on Voyent Alerts.

Starland Gravel Pit - Reclamation project: This project will complete the reclamation work that was started last year at the Starland Gravel Pit site, where gravel extraction operations have ceased. The project involves restoring the land to its natural state by grading, seeding, planting trees and shrubs, installing erosion control measures and fencing. Dates TBA on Voyent Alerts.

We appreciate your patience and cooperation as we work on these important public works projects this summer. We hope you enjoy the benefits they will bring to our community for years to come.

SEED CLEANING PLANT UPDATE




Seed cleaning plant under construction 2023

CUTTING HAY IN STARLAND COUNTY DITCHES

Starland County roadside grass moving for local roads will begin on July 15.

If you wish to harvest the roadside vegetation for hay along Starland County right-of-ways, please contact the Agricultural Services department as soon as possible. This will allow our road crew to plan their work accordingly and avoid areas intended for hay.

Alberta Transportation is responsible for roadside grass control on primary and secondary highways.

Information required by the agricultural services department will include:

- Location of the road ditch (including north/south/east/west)
- Your contact information

ROADSIDE WEED & BRUSH CONTROL SPRAYING

The Starland Agricultural Service Board will be SPOT SPRAYING along municipal rights-of-way beginning June 1st until completion for the control of noxious weeds and brush. The program will affect approximately 33% of the Municipality.

All spraying is carried out by licensed pesticide applicators following the Industrial Vegetation Management of Alberta (IVMAA) standards and practices. Roadsides adjacent to farmsteads, gardens, canola, legumes and other sensitive vegetation will be omitted unless weed populations warrant spraying.

NOTE: Pesticide use will be determined by weather conditions, targeted weeds, and surrounding vegetation. Any one of the following products or a combination of registered tank mixes may be used.

- Milestone - Clearview - Garlon - Occtain XL - Navius

SPRING PLANTING GUIDE

The best time to start plants in Starland County will depend on the type of plants you want to grow, as well as the local climate conditions. Starland County has a continental climate, which is characterized by cold winters and warm summers.

In general, the growing season in Starland County starts in late May or early June, when the soil has warmed up and the risk of frost has passed. This is the best time to start outdoor plants, such as flowers, vegetables, and herbs. Cool-season crops, such as lettuce and spinach, can be started a bit earlier, in late April or early May, but will need protection from frost.

It's also a good idea to check with your local nursery or gardening center for specific recommendations based on the type of plants you want to grow and the conditions in your area. They can provide you with advice on when and how to start your plants, as well as the best soil, sun, and water requirements for your specific situation.

RED DEER RIVER WEED CONTROL

The River Weed Control Program aims to inspect, and control listed weeds along the shorelines of flowing bodies of water in Starland County, such as the Red Deer River. Flowing waters allows weed seeds to disperse over vast distances. By controlling these infestations early, the County can help limit the spread of existing problems and prevent new ones from occurring.


Starland County has been involved with control of the Tansy problem along the Red Deer riverbeds for years. Our neighbours to the north and west also have their programs and actively involved in inspections and control of Tansy weed. The partner we all have in common that helps fund these programs are Alberta Environment.

Our program involves traveling the river and infestations are mapped by GPS, then crews use various methods to control the infestations. Some measures involved are; hand pulling, clipping buds/seed-heads, herbicide application or even mechanical control through weed whacking and mowing where feasible. A combination of the methods is also used.

Tansy weed is a difficult weed to eradicate and even with consistent control, comes many barriers that weed inspectors are up against in reducing these noxious weeds. The Provincial Designation of Tansy is Noxious, a perennial form that reproduces by both seed and short rhizomes (underground horizontal roots). It is pungently aromatic foliage has been used medicinally, as an insect repellent, and for embalming. Common tansy forms dense stands, and the plants contain alkaloids that are toxic to

both humans and livestock if consumed in large quantities. Cases of livestock poisoning are rare because tansy is unpalatable to grazing animals.



WHAT IS INTERGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT?

In the vegetation and pest management industry, a fundamental principal has been around for several years known as Integrated Pest Management (IPM). It is the management technique of using multiple methods of control to manage a pest, rather than relying on a single method. Using IPM allows us to maintain the long-term environmental viability of these areas, while still achieving our pest management goals. IPM separates into 4 categories such as mechanical, biological, chemical, and cultural/behavioural control.

Cultural Control

Our most used cultural control method is roadside seeding. The main goal is to apply grass seed and mulch mixed to establish a vegetation cover prior to wind and rain, that can create soil erosion thus wash away soil after a new construction project.

In this situation, grass serves several purposes. The deep roots aid in soil retention below soil level while the above ground vegetation reduces the impact force of heavy rainfall. Grass also competes with weeds for both space and nutrients. During grass establishment, fast growing annual weeds will grow. Our mowing program will cut the weeds down early which in turn encourages the new grass to respond by thickening and stimulating vegetative growth thus strengthening its root system. While seeding these new areas, consideration has even gone into the grass varieties we use. We have species for ease of maintenance, while still serving the goal of soil retention. By reducing soil erosion, the grass is also helping improve water quality, since there is less soil and nutrients entering water systems as runoff.

Mechanical Control

Our mechanical control is our roadside Mowing Program. While the principal goal is reducing roadside vegetation and light brush to increase visibility, there are many secondary goals.

These include reduced fire hazard by limiting the fuel load, allowing better snow management in the winter by encouraging an unobstructed path across the road for blowing snow creating drifting, and reducing the number of hosts available for diseases such a ergot or black knot.

Chemical Control

The Roadside Weed Control Program primarily uses a form of chemical control on undesirable species. Our primary goal is controlling noxious and prohibited noxious weeds, yet young brush species are also targeted. This is to reduce the brush before it becomes too large and established, that costly mechanical control is the only control option to remove. While the focus is on vegetation, a secondary benefit to reducing the weed population is eliminating or controlling potential hosts for many diseases or insect pests. These pests would subsequently spread and negatively impact neighbouring agricultural operations. For example, by controlling brassica weeds (shepherds purse, stinkweed), we prevent potential host of clubroot, which negatively impact canola.

Biological Control

Biological control is all about using natural predators or competitors to control a pest. Examples of bio-control agents are Leafy Spurge Beetles and Yellow Toadflax Weevils to control Leafy spurge which has not been an issue in the county and yellow toadflax, also very small infestation to concern ourselves with and can use another control to eradicate. Both species of insects are entirely selective to their hosts and will not feed on any other plant.

AGRICULTURAL CLIMATE SOLUTIONS PROGRAM

ON-FARM CLIMATE ACTION FUND (OFCAF)

WHAT IS THE ON-FARM CLIMATE ACTION FUND (OFCAF)?

OFCAF is designed to help producers tackle climate change by supporting new actions to lower greenhouse gas emissions. This is intended to reduce the risk of new practices, while expanding, sustaining and documenting activities that may not occur without this funding. The program is delivered by Results Driven Agriculture Research (RDAR) with funding from the Agricultural Climate Solutions initiative managed by Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada.

OFCAF provides financial support to producers to accelerate adoption of beneficial management practices (BMPs) that reduce greenhouse gas emissions and support increased production efficiency, sustainability, and resiliency on their farm operations.

RDAR is a program delivery partner that will administer OFCAF in Alberta, for Alberta's producers. RDAR is delivering OFCAF in three activity categories:

- 1. Improved nitrogen management
- 2. Enhanced soil health with cover crops
- 3. Strengthened rotational grazing systems

OUICK FACTS ABOUT OFCAF

- Activities to support the adoption of BMPs, like outreach, education, and training are part of the initiative.
- The program operates from August 4, 2022, to March 31, 2024.
- For 2023, new applications will need to be completed and approved in order to be eligible for funding for activities planned for implementation after April 1, 2023, with paid invoices submitted before January 31, 2024.
- Project activities must be pre-approved by RDAR in writing before starting projects.
- Invoices must be dated after April 1, 2023, and not before your approval date.
- As applications are reviewed, some BMPs and eligible expenses may not be funded as targeted outcomes are reached.
- Maximum limits are set within some categories to allow more producers to try new practices.



In addition, they fixed up the former store owned by Sam Leung, and made it into "Sam's Saloon" which is now a famous watering-hole, especially on the last Saturday of every month when their famous "Pizza Nite" is held. Visitors are able to enjoy homemade pizza with a refreshing beverage and entertainment either on-stage or inside the Saloon, depending on the weather. The volunteers make thousands of pizzas throughout the year with visitors from far and wide. It is a very popular event and in the summer months the number of pizzas made are often well over 300. Camping is also available, with donations gratefully accepted. ROWLEYWOOD, as Rowley is also known, is also famous for the many movies and commercials that have been filmed there.

of Ordinary Days" and "The Cut" were filmed there, just to mention a few. A couple of the buildings were erected for the movies and an agreement was made to keep them and they were then filled with artifacts as well.

During the summer months, students are hired to provide tours to the many guests. Visitors can tour through the church, the bank, the funeral home/pool hall, the garage, the Saloon, the store, the train station museum, the schoolhouse museum and can also enjoy the majestic grain elevators that have been preserved and designated as a provincial historical resource.

Many volunteer hours are put in monthly to fund raise. Funds go towards the maintenance and utilities of all the historic buildings this group looks after.
